- 'flip ,chart** noun [C]
a board standing on legs with large pieces of paper fixed to the top which can be turned over

- obsolete** /,ɒb.sə'l'i:t/ adjective
not in use any more, having been replaced by something newer and better or more fashionable:
Gas lamps became obsolete when electric lighting was invented.

- scar** /ska:(r)/ noun
a mark left on part of the body after an injury, such as a cut, has healed
a prominent/noticeable/ugly scar
That burn will leave a nasty scar.
scar tissue

- advent** /'æd.vənt/noun [S]
 the arrival of an event, invention or person
Life in Britain was transformed by the advent of the steam engine.

- bump** /bʌmp/ noun [C]
 a round, raised area on a surface or on the body:
Her bicycle hit a bump in the road and threw her off.
Tim had a nasty bump on his head from when he'd fallen over.

- ramp** /rʌmp/ noun [C]
 1 an artificial slope:
I pushed the wheelchair up the ramp and into the supermarket.
 2 UK a raised strip built into a road to make vehicles drive more slowly

- strain** /streɪn/ noun [C]
 1 a particular type or quality:
A strain of puritanism runs through all her work.
 2 an animal or plant from a particular group whose characteristics are different in some way from others of the same group:
Scientists have discovered a new strain of the virus which is much more dangerous.

- The study by the US Armed Forces Health Surveillance Centre is **just the latest** to suggest such a link. → There have already been other studies.

- To do something on a basis**
 weekly, yearly etc
 voluntary
 regular, permanent, temporary, one-off

- confirm** /kən'fɜ:m/ verb [I or T]
 to make an arrangement or meeting certain, often by telephone or writing:
Six people have confirmed that they will be attending and ten haven't replied yet.
Flights should be confirmed 48 hours before departure.
I've accepted the job over the phone, but I haven't confirmed in writing yet.

Did you think we **must confirm you that** is was OK for us this morning ?

- diner** /'daɪ.nər/ noun [C]
 1 someone who is eating a meal, especially in a restaurant
 2 MAINLY US a small restaurant at the side of the road

dinner /'dɪn.ər/ noun

[C or U] the main meal of the day, usually the meal you eat in the evening but sometimes, in Britain, the meal eaten in the middle of the day:

We were just having (our) dinner.

We had some friends round for dinner on Saturday.

a romantic candlelit dinner

☑ **party** /'pɑː.ti/ noun [C]

a social event where a group of people meet to talk, eat, drink, dance, etc., often in order to celebrate a special occasion:

a birthday party

a farewell party

a dinner party (= a small sometimes formal party where a meal is eaten)

Peter has/gives/throws really wild parties.
